A Lifeline for Anita: ADRA Bangladesh Delivers Food Assistance

Cyclone Remal made landfall on 26 May 2024 in the southwestern part of Bangladesh. It left a trail of destruction in the livelihood of the marginalized community in Dacope Upazila of Khulna district. It causes immense suffering to the residents of the area.

I was devastated to learn about Anita's situation. Her livelihood had been completely destroyed by Cyclone Remal, leaving her and her family in a state of despair. Anita's fish pond, which she had worked so hard to build, was swept away by the powerful winds and flooding. She was left with nothing but debris and uncertainty about the future.

With her source of income gone, Anita found herself struggling to make ends meet. She didn't have enough money to buy food for her family, and the situation seemed bleak.

The emergency response team of ADRA Bangladesh was on the ground during the disaster. They swiftly assessed the situation in Dacope Upazila of Khulna district and identified that food was the most urgent need for victims of Cyclone Remal. ADRA Bangladesh immediately launched a relief distribution programme to mitigate the hunger crisis caused by the Cyclone Remal.

The relief efforts provided by ADRA Bangladesh were a ray of sunshine for Anita and her community. Bags of rice, lentils, cooking oil, and other essential food items were distributed to the families in need. Anita's family was overjoyed to receive this support, as it meant that they could have regular meals for at least two weeks without worrying about going hungry.

System of Rice Intensification (SRI) Practice in CEP Manikganj



The System of Rice Intensification (SRI) is a modern and efficient technique of rice cultivation that has been embraced by the ADRA CEP Manikganj project to enhance rice production and reduce cultivation costs. This innovative method has been shown to increase rice yields by 15% to 25% compared to traditional methods, translating to an additional 5 to 7 kilograms of rice per decimal of land. Between 2022 and 2024, ADRA CEP Manikganj provided SRI training to 180 farmers, and currently, 184 farmers are implementing this method in their rice production.

SRI Process: The System of Rice Intensification (SRI) is a comprehensive approach that involves specific practices at each stage of rice cultivation, from land preparation to harvesting. The following sections outline the key steps involved in the SRI process:

- **1.** Land Selection and Preparation: Choose land that is free from water logging to ensure optimal growth conditions for the rice plants. Plow the land 2 to 3 times to improve soil aeration and structure, which are crucial for healthy root development.
- 2. Initial Fertilization ("Vasal Dose") Apply a one-time "Vasal Dose" of fertilizers per decimal of land: MOP (Muriate of Potash): 300 grams, TSP (Triple Super Phosphate): 700 grams, Gypsum: 300 grams, Zinc: 30

grams (applied either before or after TSP, but not simultaneously), Boron: 30 grams.

- 3. Irrigation & Water Management: Apply a sufficient amount of water to the land, and then wait until the soil dries and begins to crack slightly before the next irrigation.
- 4. *Planting:* Transplant rice seedlings aged 15-20 days, maintaining a spacing of 10 square inches between each plant. This spacing helps to promote healthy growth and reduces competition for nutrients.
- 5. Weeding and Perching: Regular weeding is essential to prevent competition from unwanted plants and to maintain soil aeration. Use perches for birds to help control harmful insects during the top-dressing period, promoting a healthier crop.
- 6. Top Dressing Fertilization: Apply the first round of urea fertilizer 15-20 days after planting. Conduct 3 to 4 top dressings at 20–25-day intervals, using a total of 700 grams of urea per decimal of land over this period. During the final top dressing, add 300 grams of MOP.
- 7. *Ripening Phase:* Ensure adequate water supply during the last 60 days of the crop's ripening phase. Cease water supply 10 days before harvesting to prepare the crop for harvest.
- By meticulously following these steps,

the SRI method can significantly enhance rice yield and ensure a healthy and robust crop.

Economic Benefits of SRI:

The adoption of SRI not only boosts rice production but also offers significant cost savings for farmers:

- 1. Irrigation Cost Reduction: SRI requires less water, thereby reducing irrigation costs.
- 2. Seed and Fertilizer Cost Savings: The method uses less seed and less fertiliser than the traditional method, with five times fewer seeds being used.
- 3. Increased Production: SRI yields 35-37 kilograms of rice per decimal, compared to 30 kilograms per decimal using traditional methods.
- 4. Disease control and pest management: Since SRI maintains sufficient spacing between plants, it facilitates easier pest management and disease control.

Conclusion:

The System of Rice Intensification (SRI) represents a transformative approach to rice cultivation, providing a sustainable and efficient method for increasing rice yields while reducing input costs. The success of SRI in the CEP Manikganj project underscores the potential of this technique to improve food security and farmer livelihoods.

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
