Gandari Succeeds in Goat Farming and Becomes Financially Stable

Gandari Sarder was a hardworking housewife living in the remote village of Dacope in Khulna, Bangladesh. With her husband struggling to make ends meet as a day laborer, Gandari knew she needed to find a way to help support her family financially. That's when she came across the Community Empowerment Project (CEP), Dacope, Khulna, run by ADRA Bangladesh.

"Every day, I had to manage complicated financial circumstances while trying to make sure my family had three well-balanced meals. I got up early to find work to support my family, but debt made this *difficult,*" Gandari unfolded her agonies.

"CEP gave me two goats to start a goat-rearing business. I didn't know how to care for the animals at first, but the project staff helped me learn. I worked hard, waking up early every morning to feed and care for my goats," said Gandari.

Gandari's hard work paid off. Her goats multiplied and she had nine healthy goats. She was happy and thanked ADRA Bangladesh for their help.

Gandari sold some of her goats to make a profit. She

sold five of her smallest goats. Gandari sold the goats quickly and made 16,000 taka. She was happy with the result, as she hadn't expected to make so much money from her goat business. She used the money to buy more food for her goats and her family. She also put some of her money towards her children's education.

"With the help of ADRA Bangladesh, I continued to receive training and support to improve my goat-rearing skills. I learned about proper breeding techniques, disease prevention, and how to market my goats effectively. I was grateful for the constant encouragement and guidance I received from the project staff, who believed in my potential and never stopped pushing me to reach greater heights," said Gandari enthusiastically.

As the years went by, Gandari's goat farming business really took off. She now had a thriving herd of goats, which provided a reliable income for her family. Gandari was no longer just a struggling housewife – she was a successful businesswoman, respected and admired by all who knew her.

Sewing-Skilled CBO Women Secure Job Opportunities through Local Agents: A Success Story from CEP Mymensingh



Vocational training programs have become essential for empowering women in rural areas, and the success of Community-Based Organization (CBO) members trained through ADRA Bangladesh's Community Empowerment Project (CEP) in Mymensingh is a prime example. Through the support of local agents like Abu Sayeed, these women secure stable jobs and contribute significantly to their family incomes.

The ADRA CEP Project aims to empower women by providing income-generating skills like sewing, and promoting financial independence. Over the past two years, 33 women from three CBO groups have received hands-on sewing training, equipping them with technical skills and boosting their confidence. This training has opened up new opportunities for employment and entrepreneurship, enabling these women to contribute to their household finances. Previously, many had little or no access to income-generating activities, but today they actively support their families. Local agent Abu Sayeed, recognizing their potential, supplies raw materials for making shopping bags, allowing them to work

from home and produce items for local markets. The impact on these women has been life-changing. Each now earns BDT 450-500 daily, turning to a monthly income of BDT 12,000-15,000. This income helps cover household expenses, education, and savings.

The sewing program has become a sustainable livelihood for these women, giving them valuable skills and direct market access. Working from home while earning an income has significantly improved their quality of life and strengthened their role within their families and communities.

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
